Threats to School Officials: Free Speech vs. Crime and What To Do If You Are Targeted



Free Speech

Non-threatening speech IS protected by the First Amendment:

- Posting hate-filled views online
- Calling to voice anger
- Organizing a gathering to promote political views
- Circulating offensive materials

What is NOT protected:

 "true threats": A serious expression of an intent to do harm to another person

Difference Between Crime and Speech

Hate-filled speech is NOT a crime!

Protected by First Amendment Right to Free Speech But some speech **does** rise to the level of a crime Words with action that are crimes:

- Stalking
- Cyberbullying
- Bomb threats
- Lying to police
- Ethnic intimidation
- False report of a felony
- Making terroristic threat

Charges for threats:

Charge	Max penalty	Requires
Cyberbullying	93 days	 posting a message in an online forum Intending to place in fear of bodily harm or death AND expressed an intent to commit violence
Malicious Use Telecommunications Device	6 months	 Email, computer, phone threats Threats to terrorize by threatening physical harm or damage to property
Stalking	1 year	 Continuing pattern of harassment Intending to make someone feel threatened/terrorized
Unlawful Posting	2 year	Encouraging others to commit violence toward a person
Communicating Threat of Terrorism	20 year	 They will do a terrorist act (i.e. politically motivated bombing, killing, etc.)
Using Computer to Commit a Crime	varies	 Must have another crime they are doing with a computer

What should you do to if you are targeted?

• If you are in immediate danger, always call 9-1-1. Your local police are first responders.

Physical Threat:

- run, hide, fight as a last resort.
- Do not engage if you can help it.

Verbal Threat:

- call the police
- write down the exact threat communicated
- description of perp
- Note what direction they went.

Electronic Threat:

- do not delete it
- print or photograph it
- contact law enforcement

Written or Visual Threat:

- handle it as little as possible
- contact law enforcement
- Note date/ time/ location
