# MPA Implementation Goal Three: Equity & Inclusion, Not Isolation



#### Strategy A: Inclusion & Equity in Aging

**Initiative 75**: 2021-2022 State Budget *proposes* a \$20 million one-time General Fund to improve and deliver **language access services** across the spectrum of Health and Human Services programs.

**Initiative 77**: Ninth <u>Ensuring Equity in Aging webinar</u> is July 7th: Culturally Responsive Programs and Services in Rural Communities

**Initiative 78**: CDA staff have attended 12 racial equity trainings since 5/2020. Developing Racial Equity Training Tool, which will inform CDA's Racial Equity Action Plan due Fall 2021.

**Initiative 80**: The Equity in Aging Advisory Committee (EAAC) has met twice and is in the process of recruiting new- in particular representation from Tribal, LGBTQ, and immigrant & refugee communities is sought.



#### Strategy B: Closing the Digital Divide

**Initiative 81:** The May Revision reflects a plan to achieve equitable statewide access to high-speed broadband internet service and *proposed* a **\$7 billion investment** to expand broadband infrastructure

\*\*\* Federal administration has launched the <u>Emergency Broadband Benefit</u> to help low-income(LI) households to afford internet service during the CV-19 pandemic.

**Initiative 82:** CDA has distributed over **8,500 smart speakers** (donated by Google) to LI older adults at risk of isolation via the AAAS and the MSSP sites and **4,000 iPads** with 2-year plans and dedicated training and technical assistance to LI older adults who live alone. Robotic pets to residents of LTC facilities is next initiative.

**Initiative 83:** The May Revision *proposed* \$17 million in Older Americans Recovery and Resiliency proposal to 1) distribute more devices and 2) launch a digital literacy training partnership to older adults



#### Strategy C: Opportunities to Work

**Initiative 85**: The May Revision *proposes* \$17 million one-time for Employment Opportunities in Older Adult Resiliency and Recovery proposal to add job slots to Senior Employment program at CDA.

#### Strategy D: Opportunities to Volunteer & Engage Across Generations

**Initiative 91**: In partnership with the California State Library and UC-Berkeley, CDA launched <u>CalChronicles</u> in May. CalChronicles collects and shares stories from older adults that shine a light on the invaluable experiences and contributions of older Californians



# **Age-Friendly California**

# June 3<sup>rd</sup>: The State of California Announces National Designation as an Age-Friendly State!

MPA Initiative 101: Begin process for California to become an AARP-Certified Age-Friendly State

California becomes the 8th state in the nation to join the AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities.

As a member of the Network, California commits to identifying the challenges of its aging population and identifying policy and programmatic solutions that will improve the quality of life for all ages in the community – in collaboration with residents, communities and partners.



Strategy E: Protection from Abuse, Neglect, Exploitation

Initiative 93: An Elder Justice Inter-Agency workgroup has been formed, and began meeting in June, to inform the development of the Elder Justice Coordinating Council (EJCC) with stakeholders. JIA and CWDA presented. The EJCC will work to increase coordination and develop recommendations to prevent and address elder abuse, neglect, exploitation, and fraud, including consideration of particular COVID-19 risks.

**Initiative 97**: The May revision *proposes* \$20 million in Older Adults Recovery & Resiliency proposal for legal services for older adults. CDA is undertaking new planning with stakeholders for state Legal Assistance Developer, as federally required.



# MPA Partnerships: Local Playbook

- The SCAN Foundation hosted a Local Playbook Convening for all 21 of their Long-Term Support Services regional coalitions. CDA presented the Playbook and the Data Dashboard and AARP shared insights into age-friendly action planning.
- CDA participated in the California Department of Public Health's; Kern, Santa Cruz & San Benito Counties' Local Playbook workshops to drive action locally. Upcoming: Inland Empire Long-Term Services and Supports (IELTSS) Coalition's convening.
- California State Association of Counties, SAC Members Shireen McSpadden and Kevin Prindville, Justice in Aging, along with CDA Director McCoy Wade, presented the Playbook, highlighting the important role of local leadership. CDA provided 2 follow-up presentation to CSAC and partners.

# MPA & Equity-Related Proposals in the State 21-22 Budget





#### **MPA & Equity-Related Budget Proposals**

Initiative 4: Advance fair housing and equity by conducting outreach, education, and surveys, as well as prosecuting violations of anti-housing discrimination laws.

- Proposed Investment: \$2 million General Fund for the Department of Fair Employment and Housing to conduct outreach education campaigns, housing surveys, and prosecute violations of anti-housing discrimination laws

Initiative 46: ... prioritize for inclusion in the budget the expansion of Medi-Cal to older adults who are undocumented.

- *Proposed* Investment: \$69 million (\$50 million General Fund) in 2021-22 and \$1 billion (\$856 million General Fund) ongoing to DHCS to expand Medi-Cal Health to undocumented adults age 60 and older. Legislature proposed age 50 and older.





#### **MPA & Equity-Related Budget Proposals**

Initiatives 54: Diversify and align with aging demographics the pipeline of residents in clinical geriatrics, primary care, and geriatric psychiatry, including dementia care....

- Proposed Investment: One-time \$8 million investment for the Office of Statewide Health Planning & Development to grow and diversify the pipeline for the geriatric medicine workforce, developing a larger and more diverse pool of health care workers with experience in geriatric medicine

Initiative 62: Continue California's leadership commitment to target clinical research into Alzheimer's on gender and racial disparities.

- Proposed Investment: \$4 million one-time General Fund for research to strengthen California's leadership on disparities and equity in Alzheimer's





#### **MPA & Equity-Related Budget Proposals**

Initiative 68: Produce "COVID 2020" report on skilled nursing facilities and COVID-19, with California lessons learned and recommendations for national (CMS) policy reform.

- Proposed Investment: One-time \$1.7 million GF investment and \$154,000 GF in 2022-23 and ongoing dollars for an analysis of the intersection of COVID-19, health disparities, and health equity, including nursing homes, to help inform future large-scale disaster or emergency response.

Initiative 75: Continue to expand culturally and linguistically competent communications to older adults, people with disabilities, and families.

- Proposed Investment: \$20 million one-time General Fund to improve and deliver language access services across the spectrum of Health and Human Services programs.



# Initiative 81: . Execute the State Broadband Council's new Strategic Plan, including older adults and using an equity lens, per Executive Order in August 2020, within existing resources.

#### Proposed Investments:

- \$7 billion investment to expand broadband infrastructure.
- \$500 million Loan Loss Reserve Account for local governments, tribes and nonprofits to secure funds to build new fiber networks and allocates \$500 million to telephone service providers in rural areas to expand service to include broadband.

#### Initiative 83: Develop plan to launch digital literacy support for older adults and for providers.

- Proposed Investment: \$17 million in Older Americans Recovery and Resiliency proposal to distribute more devices and launch a digital literacy training partnership to older adults

Note: The Broadband for All Act (<u>AB 24</u>) - November 2022 election - a \$10 billion general obligation bond to fund internet access in hard-to-reach areas of the state.

   that can expand on or deepen diverse community engagement in aging. (1-5 Rating Scale)

# About the Long Term Care Insurance Task Force

The passage of AB 567 (Calderon) established the Long Term Care Insurance Task Force in the California Department of Insurance to explore the feasibility of developing and implementing a culturally competent statewide insurance program for long-term care services and supports.

The objectives of the Task Force include the following:

- Explore how a statewide long-term care insurance program could be designed and implemented to expand the options for people who are interested in insuring themselves against the risk of costs associated with functional or cognitive disability, and require long-term care, services, and supports.
- Explore options for the design of the program, including eligibility, enrollment, benefits, financing, administration, and interaction with the Medi-Cal program and other publicly funded resources.

# MPA & LTSS: Stakeholders Identified LTSS as a Top Priority

The MPA Stakeholder Advisory Committee's <u>Long-Term Services & Supports</u> <u>Subcommittee</u> released a <u>report</u> in 2020 outlining LTSS recommendations to the Administration:

- Objective 1: A System that all Californians can Navigate
- Objective 2: Access to LTSS in Every Community
- Objective 3: Affordable LTSS Choices
- Objective 4: Highly Valued, High-Quality Workforce
- Objective 5: State and Local Administrative Structures

# MPA Goal 2: Health Reimagined & Long-Term Care

#### Strategy A: Bridging Health Care with Home

**Initiative 33:** Advocate with the new federal Administration to create a <u>universal Long-Term Services and Supports</u> <u>benefit</u> and assess opportunities for federal/state partnership.

**Initiative 34:** Plan and develop innovative models to <u>increase access to long-term services and supports for people receiving Medicare only.</u>


**Initiative 35:** Plan and develop innovative models to <u>increase access to long-term services and supports and integrated health care for people receiving both Medicare & Medi-Cal</u> ("duals"): by implementing statewide Managed Long-Term Services and Supports (MLTSS) and Dual Eligible Special Needs Plan (D-SNP) structure, in partnership with stakeholders.

Initiative 36: Expand access to home and community-based services for people receiving Medi-Cal: via CalAIM, by implementing "In Lieu of Services" (including: Housing Transition Navigation Services, Housing Deposits, Housing Tenancy and Sustaining Services, Short-term Post Hospitalization Housing, Recuperative Care, Respite, Day Habilitation Programs, Nursing Facility Transition/Diversion to Assisted Living Facilities of Home, Personal Care and Homemaker Services, Home Modifications, Medically Tailored Meals, Sobering Centers, and Asthma Remediation) and "Enhanced Care Management."

# **Ensuring Equity in Aging**

#### California Long-term Care Insurance Task Force – Work Breakdown and Considerations

- 3. Do the recommended policies and programs take into account the cultures and languages of impacted communities? For example, in determining those needs, was key information collected directly from the communities and made available in-language and in-culture?
- 4. How do the data/research inform or support the policies, statements, strategies, or conclusions? Did you refer to research conducted in a way that was/is inclusive and reflective of the demographic and cultural makeup of California?



1+ Dose Vaccination Rates by Race/Ethnicity & Age Combinations, Statewide










# COVID-19 Response, Vaccines & Equity Zip codes with under 75% of older adults vaccinated





- 76% of our 65+ older Californian population we serve have received one dose of vaccine and 63% are fully vaccinated.
- Adults 65+ make up 73% of COVID deaths in California
- Almost 70% of deaths are from communities of color



Equity gaps in vaccine rates in older adults persist, especially in Latino, Black, Native American, and other communities of color.

CDA outreach campaign will target zip codes with low vaccination rates and high population of adults 65+

- Area Agencies on Aging \$5,214,498
- Aging and Disability Resource Connection \$1,562,836
