## Introduction

In 2018, the Office of Child Protection (OCP) released its <u>Permanency Report for Los Angeles County Foster Youth.</u> Multiple research studies have demonstrated the importance of achieving permanency (being adopted by a family, returning home to live with a biological parent or parents, living with relatives, and/or living with a legal guardian), and the need to address challenges surrounding permanency to improve outcomes for youth who are or have been involved in the foster and/or probation systems. Youth who exit foster care without a permanent family or adult connection have a higher risk for increased rates of homelessness, poverty, teen pregnancy, a lack of education, and involvement with the criminal-justice system. Having a stable, permanent family and supportive community is linked with youth being able to successfully attain permanent housing, higher education, self-efficacy, and social/emotional well-being.

Caregivers and youth were interviewed for the 2018 report, and one topic repeatedly mentioned was a concern around public benefits—both the potential loss of benefits following adoption, and the lack of information on available benefits. For example, some caregivers/youth believed that once youth turned 18, they could not be adopted, and once adopted (at any age), they lost access to benefits. Not necessarily. Older foster youth have permanency options—including non-minor dependent adoptions—that leave them still eligible for Adoption Assistance Payments and Independent Living Program benefits.

These charts were compiled to provide a comprehensive resource<sup>1</sup> of foster-youth benefits to assist youth and caregivers, particularly when making permanency decisions. This document also includes a section on benefits and entitlements that can potentially still be accessed (depending on case circumstances) once a youth exits the child-welfare system.

Please note that while some benefits may <u>not</u> be available once a youth leaves foster care, youth who achieve permanency have better outcomes and more supports available as they work toward self-sufficiency.

For the purposes of this document, the term "foster youth" is defined as youth ages 14 through 20 years old, with open/active cases with the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS), including Family Maintenance, Voluntary Family Maintenance, Family Reunification, Permanent Placement, AB 12/Supportive Transition, Kin-GAP; or youth ages 16 through 24 years old with a closed case, who are/were Independent Living Program–eligible.

We would like to thank Supervisor Hilda Solis and Supervisor Kathryn Barger for bringing forward the original motion recognizing the need for increased permanency, as well as former Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas, former Supervisor Sheila Kuehl, Supervisor Holly J. Description	The Independent Living Program (ILP) provides financial assistance and services to current and former foster/probation youth ages 16 through 20. This financial assistance can help to fund items such as car insurance, driving lessons, books, and more if youth meet additional eligibility requirements.
	Youth are eligible for ILP services from their 16th birthday through the day before their 21st birthday, provided <b>one</b> of the following criteria is met:
	The youth is/was in foster care at any time from their 16th through their 19th birthdays
Eligibility	• The youth was in foster care and entered a kinship guardianship at any age <b>AND</b> is receiving/did receive Kinship Guardianship Assistance Payments (Kin-GAP) during ages 16 through 18
	<ul> <li>The youth is a former foster youth who entered a non-related legal guardianship (NRLG) after their 8th birthday AND is receiving/has received permanent placement services</li> </ul>
	Discuss adding needs to your Transitional Independent Living Plan (TILP) with your social worker. (If you have issues with the TILP, tell the judge or your attorney.)
Access/Action Steps to Receiving Benefit	When you are 16 or older, your children's social worker (CSW) will refer you to ILP. ### **Basic Living**

Priority enrollment/registration for some higher-education opportunities is available to youth per SB 906, which established that current and former foster youth (in care after their 16th birthday and now under the age of 26) are entitled to priority enrollment/registration at community colleges and California State Universities; the bill requested that the University of California grant priority enrollment/registration as well.

Priority housing is available to youth per AB 1228. This requires that CSUs and UCs allow foster youth and homeless youth priority housing and to remain in housing that is available during academic breaks at no extra charge.

Benefit Name	Adoption Assistance Program (AAP)
Benefit Department	Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS)
Benefit Description	The Adoption Assistance Program (AAP) provides financial and medical coverage to facilitate the adoption of children who otherwise would remain in long-term foster care. Adoptive families are eligible for post-adoption services that may include resource and referral connections, brief case management, and crisis intervention. Youth adopted after their 16th birthday are also eligible for Independent Living Program (ILP) services (page 6), except for housing assistance. AAP funding is paid only to an adoptive parent.

Benefit Eligibility	Once youth are determined eligible to receive AAP benefits, they remain eligible and the subsidy continues through the day before the child/youth's 18th birthday. AAP benefits can be continued through the day before the youth's 21st birthday if he or she meets at least <b>one</b> of the following:
	<ol> <li>The initial adoption assistance agreement was signed when the youth was at least 16 years old AND         <ul> <li>Youth is working toward completing high school or equivalent program OR</li> <li>Youth is enrolled in a college, community college, or a vocational education program OR</li> <li>Youth is employed at least 80 hours per month OR</li> <li>Youth is participating in a program designed to assist in gaining employment OR</li> <li>Youth is unable to do one of the above due to a medical condition</li> </ul> </li> </ol>
	2. Youth has a physical or mental disability that warrants the continuation of assistance (through the day before the youth's 21st birthday)
Access to	AAP benefits are negotiated by the children's social worker (CSW) with the adoptive parent(s) before the parent(s) sign an adoptive placement agreement with DCFS and before finalizing the adoption. The CSW makes the final determination of the amount of the AAP benefit, which is based upon the youth's needs and the circumstances of the adoptive parent(s). The AAP agreement <b>must</b> be signed before the adoption is finalized.
Benefit/Action Steps to Receiving	The extension of AAP benefits beyond age 18 depends on the adoptive parents requesting the benefit extension <b>before</b> the child/youth's 18th birthday by <b>BOTH</b> :
Benefit	<ul> <li>Calling the Foster Care/Adoption Assistance Hotline at (800) 697-4444 AND</li> <li>Providing documentation to DCFS of the child/youth's eligibility (see Benefit Eligibility)</li> </ul>
	AAP must be recertified at least every two years.

Length of Benefit	AAP benefits start on the date the AAP agreement is signed and continue through the day before the youth's 18th birthday. If the criteria are met for the two situations described above (reference 1 and 2 in "Benefit Eligibility"), the youth can continue to receive benefits through the day before the youth's 21st birthday.
Benefit Amount	Amount shall not exceed the foster-care maintenance payment and any applicable Level of Care (LOC) rate and/or specialized care increment that the child would have received while placed in a licensed or approved family home.
	The benefit amount does not increase by age; however, AAP benefits can be increased at any time if the child's needs or family's situation changes. Documentation must be presented to justify any increase.

Benefit Name	CalFresh
Benefit Department	Federal program administered through the State of California and the Los Angeles County Department of Public Social Services (DPSS)
Benefit Description	CalFresh is the California name for the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), an entitlement established to improve the nutrition of people in low-income households. CalFresh benefits are used instead of money at most grocery stores and farmers' markets.
	Eligibility for CalFresh benefits is based on the income of a household.
	Household For CalFresh purposes, a household is a group of people who live together AND buy and prepare food together. Youth under age 18 who are living with a foster family or with their biological family cannot apply for CalFresh separately from the family. In households in which meals are purchased and prepared together (i.e., Resource Family homes), non-minor dependents (NMDs) may not apply for CalFresh separately from their household. Instead, the head of household may apply for CalFresh on behalf of the entire household. In households in which meals are purchased and prepared separately (i.e., THP-NMD, renting a room in a SILP), non-minor dependents (NMDs) may apply for CalFresh as a separate household.
	<b>Income</b> CalFresh eligibility is based on the total income a household has. If a non-minor dependent is receiving Supervised Independent Living Placement (SILP) benefits, the SILP benefits count as income.
	Youth in many different placement types can apply for CalFresh, including youth living in transitional housing. However, youth living in Short-Term Residential Treatment Programs (STRTPs) or Qualified Residential Treatment Programs (QRTPs)are not eligible for CalFresh.
