The City of Birmingham strives to maintain quality neighborhoods and a clean environment. In an effort to achieve this goal, we are committed to reducing blight by educating our residents, enforcing laws, targeting violators and encouraging ongoing compliance.

In some instances, residents may not be aware of the various code and zoning violations that could be occurring on their property or properties around them; and may also need resources on how to address these violations.

The most common code violations include:

- High weeds, trash, junk and debris in yards
- Illegally parked vehicles in a front yard and inoperable vehicles
- Failure to maintain structures
- Businesses using residential property

Here's how you can help:

- Remove any violations occurring on your property to prevent enforcement actions.
- Keep your property (area from centerline of street to middle of alley) clear of weeds, trash and debris.
- Make sure tree removal and building contractors are properly hauling away tree limbs and construction debris from renovation projects.
- Survey your block and report violations by calling 311, which is open Monday – Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

- Organize a cleanup in your neighborhood by partnering with Keep Birmingham Beautiful.

- Put bulk trash and limbs out for pick up on the day before your area is scheduled. If you are unsure of your schedule, call 311 or visit www. birminghamal.gov/bulktrash.
- Learn how to report illegal dumping activity at www.birminghamal.gov/illegaldumping
- Request a No Dumping Sign for problem areas in your neighborhood by contacting 311 or call 205-254-2489
- To report stray or aggressive dogs, call 311.
- Use community-wide dumpsters and the City's Eastern Areas Landfill for additional household garbage/refuse, trash and brush.

Common Code Violations



Property owners/occupants must maintain yards, ditches, trenches and anything else connected to the property. Areas must be free of obstructions, overgrown vegetation, etc.

Junk, trash and debris in yards Junk, auto parts, furniture, household appliances, trash, tires, building materials, tree trimmings, and any other debris cannot be left in a yard.

A vehicle is considered inoperable if a current tag is not displayed on it, and/ or it is not fully equipped to legally and safely operate on public streets.

Illegally parked vehicles

Residential parking is permitted for operational passenger cars and motorcycles only in a legal driveway or garage. It's also illegal to use the city right of way for long-term parking or the storage of vehicles or equipment.

Common Code Violations



Illegally parked commercial vehicles

Commercial equipment and commercial vehicles cannot be parked or stored in a residential area.

Illegal dwelling units

It's illegal to add dwelling units to a structure's interior/exterior without proper permits, regardless of how long the structure has existed.

Failure to maintain structures

A building's exterior structure and walls must be maintained in a secure and attractive manner. Also, any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, windows, screens, etc. must be maintained in a weather tight, rodent-proof and sound condition.

Illegal businesses run in residential areas

Most businesses are not allowed to operate in residential areas. Running a business requires zoning approval, a Birmingham business tax receipt and more.

Zoning Enforcement

1. Business Use of Residential Property

Any use, whether for pay or not, that would normally be considered a commercial use (such as auto repair, continuous yard sales, beauty salon, commercial equipment, commercial vehicles, etc.), is a zoning issue.

2. Fences/Walls

Any construction or repair of a fence or wall requires a zoning permit; 4 ft. maximum height in a front yard (any yard facing a street), 8 ft. maximum height in a rear or side yard; an additional foot in height can be added with features at the top of the fence. *New requirement*

- Chain link fences are not allowed in a front yard;
- 2. Natural wood permitted at front, rear and side;
- 3. Finished side of fence must face adjacent property and thoroughfares;
- 4. Barbed wire and razor wire permitted in rear only, in commercial, industrial, and manufacturing districts;
- 5. Electrified fences prohibited in all yards;
- 6. Fences to be well maintained, upright, and free of missing or broken parts;
- 7. Construction of fences from pallets is prohibited.

3. Outside Storage

This is a zoning issue when it occurs alone or in connection with a business use of the property.

4. Inoperable Vehicles/Junk

Zoning issue, 30 days (junkyard use or business use), or could be a Department of Public Works issue (just junk outside).

5. Garbage

Public Works deals with any issues related to garbage cans, collection, or litter. CALL 311.

6. Right-of-Way

Any items in the right-of-way, CALL 311 for routing to the Birmingham Police Department or the Right-of-Way Division of Planning, Engineering and Permits.

7. Animals

More than 4 pets, farm animals, etc., is a zoning issue.

8. Building Without a Permit

This is an issue for the building inspectors. CALL 311.

9. Parking in the Front Yard

Normally, this is an issue to be reported to the Birmingham Police Department. However, it is considered a zoning violation.

Zoning Enforcement

10. Carports and Other Accessory Structures

Limited to the rear yard unless connected to the main structure and of compatible materials.

11. Communal Living Facilities

More than 3 unrelated persons living together in a single housekeeping unit is a zoning violation.

12. Childcare Facilities

Requires a Zoning Certificate of Operation (ZCO). Zoning district determines what type of childcare facility is allowed. All childcare facilities require a ZCO. *New requirement*

13. Signage

Normally, a separate permit. Size and location may be dictated by the Zoning Board of Adjustment, "Q' conditions, subdivision and other regulatory processes.

14. A Use Not Allowed

Any use/activity not allowed in a district is a zoning issue.

15. Zoning Ordinance Requirements: Special Exceptions, Variances and Parking Modifications

Granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) when specific justifications exist according to the Zoning Ordinance.

16. Subdivision

Resurveying of properties (i.e., two lots into one, one lot into two, etc.), granted by the Subdivision Committee of the Birmingham Planning Commission and when the vacation or dedication of right-of-way is involved, approval must be granted by City Council.

17. Rezoning

Changing the zoning district of the property must be granted by City Council.

18. Special Districts

Properties in Historic Districts, Overlay Districts, and Commercial Revitalization Districts require approval for development by the Urban Design staff, Senior Planning staff or the Design Review Committee.

Office of the City Attorney's Drug and Nuisance Abatement by the Numbers

Since 2020, the City of Birmingham's City Attorney's Office has used civil court to hold landowners accountable for getting rid of crime and blight associated with nuisance issues. Those who fail to comply could face up to thousands in fines.

DNAT has taken 15 landlords or property owners to court, securing nearly \$50,000. The money goes to the City's Neighborhood Revitalization Fund to help in the City's revitalization efforts.

Violators have had to add security guards, improve outdoor lighting, add security cameras and more to address issues at problem properties.

The ABC's of Code Enforcement for Citizens

- A If you see a problem in your area, take **ACTION**. Download the Birmingham Police Department App. Report problems to 311.
- Become a **BLOCK** watch captain. Contact the crime prevention officer at your local precinct for guidance. Also, the Citizen's Police Academy begins Oct. 4, 2022 at 6 p.m. To sign up and to get the location, contact BPD's COPE Division at 205-933-4175 or email bpdcope@birminghamal.gov. All classes will be in person. This is a 10-week program with classes meeting every Tuesday from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. and on one Saturday from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m.

How to report a code violation to the City of Birmingham

- If you notice a code violation in your neighborhood, call 311 and submit a complaint.
- Please be sure to include the date of the violation and the address.
- Once the city receives the complaint, a city investigator will go out and investigate.
- After an investigation has been done, the magistrate's office will determine if a violation occurred and if a person will be charged.
- If a person is charged, they will be notified that they have a charge pending against them for violating an ordinance.
- The case will be then heard in Environmental Court.
- Environmental Court is held every Wednesday at 9 a.m. in Birmingham Municipal court. The
 docket consists of cases generated by Public Works and Code Enforcement. (Cases include
 dilapidated structures, tires on the ground, engines and old appliances in the yard, windows
 out in homes, etc.).

Cleaning Illegal Dumpsites

Illegal dumping continues to be a challenge in Birmingham. On average, crews collect 300 tons of bulk trash and illegal dump piles a week. However, bulk trash crews spent eight days in Wylam in August 2022, and collected more than 300 tons of bulk trash and illegal dump piles.

Birmingham residents may dump at the Eastern Area Landfill's Public Unloading Area, which is a cement pad where residents can drive their vehicles for drop off. To be eligible for drop offs, individuals must show a driver's license, proving they live in Jefferson County. There is no fee for residential disposal.

25,000 household garbage carts will be distributed across four quadrants of Birmingham between late October and November 2022.

The next set of 25,000 carts will be distributed between December 2022 and January 2023. These are 96-gallon carts.

DPW will receive four, automated trucks coming in late fall 2022. These will work with the household garbage carts.

DPW will have four more automated trucks coming by the end of the year. These will work with the household garbage carts.

In addition to the eight automated trucks, DPW will have eight limb loaders to collect bulk trash. These should arrive by the end of 2022.

Critical Repair Program Update

The City of Birmingham's Critical Repair Program is slated to start accepting new applications in late fall 2022. Only Birmingham residents may apply. Applications will not be accepted before the program is active. The program will be administered through an external non-profit organization. For more information, call the City's Community Development Department at 205-254-2309.

Eligible Homeowners

Eligible program participants must own and occupy the home to be repaired and have no intent of discontinuing occupancy of the home in the foreseeable future. Eligible program participants must meet the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) income requirements for low-and-moderate income households at the time of application. Eligible program participants must be current on property taxes for the assisted unit.

Eligible Properties/ Repairs

Only single-family homes that are owner-occupied within the Birmingham city limits can qualify. Repairs to conditions threatening the health and safety of the occupants are eligible. The following repairs are considered as eligible repairs under the Critical Repair program:

Roof Replacement HVAC repair of replacement Plumbing repairs

Electrical repairs

Limited sewer repairs Limited structural repairs

Exterior painting

Reminders:

Rental properties do not qualify.

Up to \$30,000 in grant funding will be made available per house for eligible critical repairs.

Homeowners with current code enforcement violations are not eligible.

(Violations would have to be rectified before approval of application).
