	Jurisdictional Updates:	

Chris Workman for Philomath – The Streetscape Project got submitted. Still need MAC final approval but still on track and on schedule to get the bid out end of May and start construction in the summer. There is a big overlay on Mount Union and south side of Benton View Drive that is scheduled over the summer. That will use the last city grant received last year. The other two street projects are Landmark Drive on the far east end of town. The city has approved a Local Improvement District on that street. Still trying to get a Local Improvement District approved. Council is not liking the idea of having neighbors pay too much into the project and the city will pay more. ARPA funds will help with this project to get sidewalk installed. Starting engineering on 16th street in front of the elementary school. The project includes widening the sidewalk into 17th street.

Rebecca Houghtaling for OSU – Washington Way continues to move forward. Still planning on doing waterline replacements. Messaging to the OSU community will take place. Community Hall Slope first phase is almost complete. Getting a lot of permits for projects. OSU has all the permits for Reeser and there is a lot of concrete work going on.

Lisa Scherf for Corvallis – Scherf shared a link in the zoom chat for the city's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) which is currently out for public comment. Comments may be submitted to Greg Gescher, Assistant Public Works Director. There has been a reorganization that has taken affect and Gescher has been placed into a position that had been in place in the past. With that update, Jeff McConnel is now taking Gescher's former position. There will also be a new Transportation Division Manager position which will be Lisa Scherff's boss. That position will be posted soon, and they will be the representative to the CAMPO TAC.

Resurfacing projects in the current CIP include – Technology Loop will have buffer bike lanes added. They will also improve the NE corner of Technology Loop and Research Way. The second paving project is Fernwood and the third one is 9<sup>th</sup> Street. Tim bates has been working closely with Meredith Williams and Sara Bronstein on transit facility

Highway 20 Community Path and 53 <sup>rd</sup> overpass both came up. Commissioner Malone mentioned the path from Circle to Adair Village. Phase one of the Callapooia Building has been completed. Phase two is underway. There is a twelve week delay due to the supply chain shortage. The community path from Merloy to Pilkington is in conjunction with the ODOT safety improvement project will go to bid late this year or early next year. This morning, Benton County health officials think there is an announcement coming that the mask mandate will end on the 19 <sup>th</sup> of this month.

Re: Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) Amendments

#### **Overview**

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide an update on recent and ongoing amendments to the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) relevant to the Corvallis Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO). A summary table of amendments can be found on the following page.

#### **Background on the STIP and MTIP**

The STIP is the Oregon Department of Transportation's capital improvement plan for state and federally-funded transportation projects. The current STIP (FY2021-2024) went into effect October 1, 2020 and expires September 30, 2024. CAMPO acts as the regional coordinator to the STIP helping ensure that amendments and other adjustments are processed appropriately. CAMPO also maintains a Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program (MTIP) which is consistent with the STIP.

#### **Amendment Types**

There are three types of STIP and MTIP amendments processed by CAMPO:

- Full Amendments: Require the greatest level of scrutiny including communicating project information to the Policy Board. The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) determines if significant public outreach is necessary. At a minimum, the item will be reviewed by the TAC and placed on the next Policy Board agenda, which comes with notification requirements. Additional items for consideration include provision of a public comment period (two weeks), holding a public meeting, and any other actions deemed advisable by the TAC.
- Administrative Amendment: Require less scrutiny and are usually familiar to local staff
  members. Administrative amendments are brought to the TAC for discussion and approval. The
  Policy Board is notified of Administrative Amendments at their next regularly scheduled meeting.
- Adjustment: For minor changes, CAMPO staff has the authority to approve adjustments.
   Adjustments do not require committee approval or public notice.

Criteria

#### **Purpose**

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide an overview of project evaluation criteria used for the last Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program (MTIP) cycle (FY2021-2024). The criteria discussed applies to Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funding distributed through the Corvallis Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO). An overview of the discussion leading to the development of the 2019 evaluation criteria is provided below. Appendix B, taken from the current MTIP (FY2021-2024), provides additional details.

#### 2019 Update to Evaluation Criteria

In preparation for the FY2021-24 MTIP cycle CAMPO staff engaged in discussions with FHWA staff, ODOT staff, and transportation staff from cities and MPOs across the country on how to best leverage MPO funds through both planning and construction activities. In these conversations, FHWA and ODOT stressed the importance of ensuring projects are completed in the timeframe originally identified, while cities and MPOs in other parts of the state/country have strived to align their financial programming with long range community goals. On top of this, they have streamlined their application and funding process, and provided more transparency to the public.

After discussions with the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and Policy Board, CAMPO staff updated the evaluation criteria for the first time since 2004. Goals of the update were to make the application process more efficient and transparent. The updated criteria were designed to adhere to the CAMPO Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), while also considering the need to prioritize preserving the existing system.

#### Notes from 2019 Evaluation Criteria Discussion

Other notes from 2019 discussion on the evaluation criteria include:

- There was a discussion on potentially combining modernization and preservation projects into one list, however, the TAC agreed to keep the criteria separate
- The general assumption from the TAC and Board was that preservation is a priority, but modernization projects would be evaluated on a case by case basis.
  - The TAC agreed to continue to develop two separate lists of projects, with a focus on preservation projects.
  - As long as there is a good case for a modernization project, members can and should apply
- The TAC and Board agreed that money could be put aside for scoping studies on a case by case basis
- The TAC intended to review the criteria again prior to the next cycle to avoid multiple projects scoring the same

- There was a desire from ODOT to use a more prescribed format for the project proposals (proposal form)
  - o TAC members generally felt the CAMPO review process was working well
  - o TAC members viewed the criteria as a tool to assist in the development of prioritized list

#### **Action Requested**

• Discuss evaluation criteria outlined in Appendix B of the FY2021-24 CAMPO MTIP

#### Appendix B: Project Selection Criteria for CAMPO's STBG Funds

For the 2021-2024 TIP, changes were made to the evaluation criteria in order to make it easier to evaluate projects and to be more in line with the current Regional Transportation Plan. The updated evaluation criteria were adopted by the Policy Board in May 2019. Clarification on eligibility was also made—historically only projects along arterials and collectors were thought to be eligible and while that is the primary focus of STBG funding, exceptions do exist including corridor programs, recreational trails, pedestrian and bicycle projects, and safe routes to school projects, all which are within the public right of way. The request for projects is copied below.

#### **Project Eligibility + Funding**

Projects must be within the Corvallis Area MPO, an identified project in the 2017 CAMPO Regional Transportation Plan (found <a href="here">here</a>) for the Modernization category, and identified in a local plan for the Preservation category. Projects should generally located on arterials or collectors. Other projects are eligible as identified by FHWA on their Surface Transportation Block Grant <a href="website">website</a> and copied below:

In general, STBG projects may not be on local roads or rural minor collectors. There are a number of exceptions to this requirement, such as the ability to use up to 15% of a State's rural suballocation on minor collectors. Other exceptions include: bridge and tunnel projects; safety projects; fringe and corridor parking facilities/programs; recreational trails, pedestrian and bicycle projects, and safe routes to school projects; boulevard/roadway projects largely in the right-of-way of divided highways; inspection/evaluation of bridges, tunnels, and other highway assets; port terminal modifications; and projects within the pre-FAST Act title 23 definition of "transportation alternatives." [23 U.S.C. 133(c)]

Projects will be evaluated and ranked by the Technical Advisory Committee, and made public for comment before final approval by the CAMPO Policy Board.

#### **Evaluation Criteria**

The following criteria are proposed for project evaluation in the FY2021-2024 TIP. These criteria are subject to change and approval by the TAC. Projects will be sorted into Preservation and Modernization, and then combined into one overall funding list.

Applicants for funding must demonstrate how their proposed project meets the evaluation criteria identified on the following page.

#### **Scoping Studies**

Up to 10% of funds will be used to conduct scoping studies for long range, complex projects identified by CAMPO members. Projects will be evaluated for funding on a case by case basis.

#### **Public Process + Timeline**

The technical advisory committee will evaluate projects at their June meeting. The preliminary project list will be open for public comment in July, and the Policy Board will make their final decision in August. Details on the Policy Board and TAC meetings can be found at the CAMPO website: <a href="www.corvallisareampo.org">www.corvallisareampo.org</a>. Any questions or additional information can be requested through staff at the contact information listed above.

The public process will consist of a virtual open house that contains a map and description of each project. The virtual open house will available in both English and Spanish languages. It will be advertised through handouts at established group meetings as well as community destinations. The virtual open house will also be noticed in the newspaper. All handouts and announcements will be bi-lingual.

Dear Senator Merkley & Senator Wyden,

The Corvallis Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO) is pleased to support Benton Area Transit's proposal for funding to purchase six new buses. This much needed investment is consistent with the goals of regional transportation planning documents adopted for the Corvallis Urbanized Area and would directly support safe and reliable public transportation service in the region.

The Corvallis Area MPO recently went through a process to develop performance measures, in an effort to reduce greenhouse gas emissions (GHGs) and vehicle miles traveled (VMT). After 12 months of engagement with city staff, county staff and elected officials, the plan was adopted in February 2020. Investment in new transit vehicles would directly support this effort and aid in the reduction of GHGs. More recently, CAMPO completed an update to the long-range Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) which emphasizes investment in transit as an important tool for reducing vehicle miles traveled and congestion. The RTP was completed in February 2022 so we applaud Benton Area Transit for moving forward to ensure the long-term viability of their fleet.

Benton Area Transit has a strong record of providing high-quality service and collaborating with other public transportation providers. BAT connects rural and urban Oregonians to essential health services as well as employment, education and commercial centers. BAT has the capacity and experience to acquire new buses and put them into service quickly and efficiently filling a direct need in our region.

CAMPO fully supports this proposal and we urge you to fund this effort.
