

2021 Implementation Sites Project Call for Applications

The National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges (NCJFCJ) is inviting applications from tribal dependency court(s) to become a Tribal Model Court within the NCJFCJ Implementation Sites Project. NCJFCJ, with funding from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), has been partnering with courts across the country since 1992 to improve outcomes for abused and neglected children and their families¹.

The NCJFCJ Implementation Sites Project provides child abuse and neglect courts with training, technical assistance, and support to guide program improvement, sustainability, and performance. As part of their involvement in this project, Implementation Sites are expected to implement meaningful change, evaluate progress, and share challenges and successes with other courts across the country.

The Implementation Sites will integrate promising practices, as recommended by the NCJFCJ's Enhanced Resource Guidelines: Improving Court Practices in Child Abuse and Neglect Cases (ERGs)². The Enhanced Resource Guidelines focus on effective dependency court hearing practices to improve the lives of children and families involved in dependency matters. The Enhanced Resource Guidelines serve as a blueprint for training on child abuse and neglect practices, and is monumental in shaping the way courts handle cases to best serve the children and families involved in the court system. The Enhanced Resource Guidelines covers all stages of the court process, from the preliminary protective hearing until juvenile and family court involvement has ended, which leads to the child safely being returned home or placed in a new, secure and legally permanent home.

The NCJFCJ supports courts by providing guidance and technical assistance to allow courts to focus on the adoption of recommended practices outlined in the *Enhanced Resource Guidelines and Key Principles of Permanency Planning*. The NCJFCJ will work with the new implementation sites by helping the sites identify impediments and challenges to improving their current court practice and the delivery of services to families and children. As part of this effort, judicial leadership and effective collaboration are viewed as essential for project success.

Program Overview

NCJFCJ is selecting new tribal court sites to participate in the Implementation Sites Project. The sites will receive targeted training, technical assistance, and support from NCJFCJ staff over a two-year period to implement the best practices identified in the ERGs which include: One family —One Judge case assignment, time- specific calendaring, children in court, use of alternative dispute resolution methods, substantive high- quality hearings and pre-petition attorney representation. The project is divided into two phases.

Phase One – Assessment and Planning

During Phase One, the selected implementation sites will focus on assessing court practices and developing an action plan to implement practices outlined in the ERGs and recommended in the Initial Site Visit Report. Activities in Phase One include:

- Court self-assessment
- Initial site visit and report
- Introductory Enhanced Resource Guidelines training
- Goal setting and action planning
- Monthly meetings with Site Manager
- Lead Judges and All Sites meetings

Phase Two – Implementation

Phase Two will focus on prioritizing and implementing goals identified on the action plan developed in Phase One. Phase Two activities will include:

- Tailored training and technical assistance
- Site Visit(s)
- Sustainability and transition planning
- Monthly meetings with Site Manager
- Lead Judges and All Sites meetings

Program Benefits and Expectations

The selected Implementation Sites will receive individualized assessments, training, and technical assistance as they seek to implement the principles and recommendations set forth in the *Enhanced Resource Guidelines* and work toward improving practices and outcomes. NCJFCJ is committed to partnering with tribal courts and tribal governments to ensure the technical assistance is tailored to serve the community.

Selected Implementation Sites will serve as "laboratories for change" by participating in an ongoing assessment process of their performance. Implementation Sites will be expected to share their results with the NCJFCJ and other sites in order to inform and sustain a larger system improvement effort.

The NCJFCJ will designate a Site Manager to work with and guide each Implementation Site. The Site Managers work closely with individual sites to help facilitate systems change efforts through regular contact and communication to develop, prioritize, and achieve goals and provide thorough, timely, and



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tailored technical assistance. Site Manager utilize a variety of tools to assess Implementation Sites, including site visits, multidisciplinary trainings, and technical assistance



Site Visits

Site visits give Site Managers the opportunity to identify strengths, challenges, and technical assistance needs of the Implementation Sites, and to provide a seamless continuum of analysis and feedback to the courts. During site visits, Site Managers engage in a combination of the following activities:

- Court hearing observations
- Stakeholder interviews
- Assessment of court practices
- Tour of court facilities

Multidisciplinary Training

Implementation sites will receive an introductory training on the ERGs early in the project. In addition, the NCJFCJ may help develop and fund or co-sponsor training with a defined topic area depending on the goals and needs of a site.

Technical Assistance

The Implementation Site Lead Judges and multidisciplinary collaborative team members regularly turn to their Site Managers for information on a wide range of topics related to court and agency reform initiatives, including legal issues, policy issues, programmatic and practice issues, and resource and funding issues.

Project Expectations

- o Implementation Sites are expected to participate in the project for two years or until a level of self-sustainability is achieved. Sites must select a judicial lead.
- o Implementation Sites require a judicially-led stakeholder collaborative that consists of system partners (child welfare agency, attorneys, CASA, GAL etc).
- o Implementation Sites (lead judge and stakeholder collaborative) are expected to participate in monthly meetings with their assigned Site Manager.
- o Implementation Sites are expected to make good faith efforts to implement the *Enhanced Resource Guidelines* and *Key Principles for Permanency Planning for Children*.
- o Implementation Sites commit to active development, facilitation, and participation in assessments, action planning, site visits, and on-site trainings and meetings.
- The Lead Judge and select team members commit to attending All-Site Conferences and Lead Judges' Meetings.
- Implementation Sites are encouraged to coordinate with and participate in Court Improvement Project (CIP) initiatives.
- Implementation Sites are encouraged to share their successes and challenges with other project sites.

Application Guidelines and Timelines

Courts applying to become one of the new Implementation Sites should complete the online <u>APPLICATION</u>. Prior to completing the application, please review the application to have a better understanding of the questions asked and the information you will need to have when completing the application. The sample application can be found beginning on page 5 of this packet.



Please note that a letter of support from the Presiding Judge of the jurisdiction is required as part of the application. The survey application will have an open text box to allow you to copy/paste this letter into it. The application also has an essay component and each court should specifically identify the strengths and the challenges of their jurisdiction. The essay should discuss why the court is interested in participating in the project as well as the strengths of the court team and areas the court could improve in.

Application Timelines

The application closes on April 16, 2021
Applicants will be notified of the selected Implementation Sites by April 26, 2021
