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Civic engagement


- 1. Formal political participation voting, discussing politics with family and friends, posting on social media
- 2. Social activism or social movement participation petitions, protests
- 3. Civic voluntarism charitable contributions, volunteer service

Civic engagement or participation is predicted by individual/background attributes, interpersonal influences, and contextual factors such as media, place of residence, and employment.

Civic Infrastructure Government **Education Civil Society** Community Agency (non-profit, (K-12,Media Coordination higher ed) faith, for profit) **Built and Natural Environment**

Equity is the ultimate determinant of wellbeing – usually based on place and race







Wellbeing and place

Zip code > Genetic code

Health and wellbeing are shaped over a lifetime of living in homes, using transportation, accessing services, and participating in the economy

We live out our lives, and our health, in <u>places</u>.

Why is wellbeing an important value for economic development?

- Our health and wellbeing are is part of our shared humanity
- Critical for learning, working, and caring for others
- Poor health and mental wellbeing make it difficult to be a productive member of society
- Healthy activities promote social connection and help build community
- We live out our lives, and our health, in places



Potential impacts of our built environment on human wellbeing

Factor	Direct impacts	Indirect or longer-term impacts
Transportation	Respiratory illness; Crashes and injuries; Cardiovascular health	Mental health; Community cohesion; Access to education, jobs, services (grocery, healthcare)
Housing	Ability to afford other basic needs (food, childcare); Injuries; Respiratory illness; Maternal and child health; Mental health	Family stability; Educational attainment; Job opportunity; Access to parks and transportation options; Life expectancy
Community Design	Community and social cohesion; Mental health; Public safety	Access to education, jobs, services (grocery, healthcare); Educational attainment; Life expectancy
Environment	Respiratory illness; Drinking water; Cardiovascular health; Mental health	Community cohesion; Learning

<u>Community Benefit Agreements</u> - paired with specific development projects to support impacted residents and businesses

Build partnerships between residents, small businesses, and the development community

Address specific impacts of construction or displacement

- 1. Action-oriented
- 2. Focus on equity
- 3. Highly measurable

Civic infrastructure and civic engagement are about -

Space: The right to move freely and congregate

Speech: The right to free speech

Health: The right to be healthy and well

Power: The right to vote
