Recommended funding sources: \$5.775 million in federal Community Development Block Grant and \$8.872 million in G.O. Bonds.

Supplemental Appropriation request: \$13.647 million

No estimated FY22 appropriations.

Project Description: The project includes the acquisition and construction of a two-floor building on 1.26 acres at 11600 Nebel Street to provide congregation, meals, and medical and

case management services. The facility allows for 97-102 beds per floor and includes expanded shower and restroom facilities, dining, food prep, medical exam, multi-purpose, case management and group therapy spaces.

Work is scheduled to be completed by the end of calendar year 2021.

Project Need: The project is needed because County facilities supporting homeless sheltering and associated services are insufficient for the current population and future projection. The current facility that provides these services at Taft Court in Rockville will not be available starting in January 2022.

Project Costs: Executive staff provided an updated cost for the purchase of the facility of \$5.497 million, and the change would reduce federal Community Development Block Grant funding by \$278,000. However, Executive staff explained that \$278,000 would be shifted to cover construction costs for environmental remediation, resulting in increased G.O. Bond funding of that amount.

Public Comments: A public hearing was held on April 6, 2021, and the Council received testimonies from two speakers in support of the project. The Council also received correspondence supporting the expedient completion of the facility to allow recreation facilities being used for homeless sheltering to revert to their original use.

Council staff recommendation: Approve the project with changes in land acquisition and construction expenditure and sources of funding, as reflected on ©5.

I am recommending a supplemental appropriation to the FY21 Capital Budget and amendment to the FY21-26 Capital Improvements Program in the amount of \$13,647,000 for the Emergency Homeless Shelter (No. P602103). Appropriation for this project will fund acquisition and construction of a facility to provide services for individuals seeking shelter.

This increase is needed because the current facility that provides shelter service, located at Taft Court in Rockville, will no longer be available starting January 2022. And, due to COVID-19, the maximum occupancy at each County shelter has decreased to allow for social distancing and spacing of beds. The facility will provide space for congregation, meal service, medical offices, and case management offices.

I recommend that the County Council approve this supplemental appropriation and amendment to the FY21-26 Capital Improvements Program in the amount of \$13,647,000 and specify the source of funds as GO Bonds and Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

Background

- 1. Section 307 of the Montgomery County Charter provides that any supplemental appropriation shall be recommended by the County Executive who shall specify the source of funds to finance it. The Council shall hold a public hearing on each proposed supplemental appropriation after at least one week's notice. A supplemental appropriation that would comply with, avail the County of, or put into effect a grant or a Federal, State or County law or regulation, or one that is approved after January 1 of any fiscal year, requires an affirmative vote of five Councilmembers. A supplemental appropriation for any other purpose that is approved before January 1 of any fiscal year requires an affirmative vote of six Councilmembers. The Council may, in a single action, approve more than one supplemental appropriation. The Executive may disapprove or reduce a supplemental appropriation, and the Council may reapprove the appropriation, as if it were an item in the annual budget.
- 2. Section 302 of the Montgomery County Charter provides that the Council may amend an approved capital improvements program at any time by an affirmative vote of no fewer than six members of the Council.
- 3. The County Executive recommends the following capital project appropriation increases:

- 5. The County Executive recommends an amendment to the FY21-26 Capital Improvements Program and a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$13,647,000 for Emergency Homeless Shelter (No. P602103) and specifies that the source of funds will be GO Bonds and Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).
- 6. Notice of public hearing was given and a public hearing was held.

ESTIMATED SCHEDULE

The work is planned to be completed by the end of calendar year 2021.

PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

The County facilities supporting homeless sheltering and associated services are insufficient for the current population and future projection. And due to COVID-19, the maximum occupancy at each County homeless shelter has decreased to allow for social distancing and spacing of beds. This project will acquire an existing building, or buildings, and retrofit the facility to include space for congregation, meal service, medical offices, and case management offices. The current facility that provides these services, located at Taft Court in Rockville, will no longer be available starting January of 2022. This facility will ensure that a full complement of homeless services are available to the men and women seeking emergency shelter in Montgomery County.

FISCAL NOTE

Cost estimates are placeholders and will be updated once a particular facility has been identified. FY21 supplemental in Community Development Block Grant for the amount of \$5,775,000, G.O. Bonds for the amount of \$7,872,000.
