Background

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the Council's FY22 budget review process included a consent calendar approval of several department/office budgets with the plan that those departments/offices would be scheduled for a Committee oversight review session in the Fall of 2021. The purpose of these oversight sessions is to provide the Committees with an opportunity to meet with Department/Office Directors; receive updates on key programs or initiatives; and review any relevant spending or performance data.

The Education and Culture Committee met on April 26, 2021 to review the County Executive's FY22 Recommended Budget request for a program enhancement of \$100,000 for the Montgomery Coalition for Adult English Literacy (MCAEL). The Committee recommended an increase to MCAEL's Non-Department Account and although MCAEL was not a consent calendar item in the budget review process, be included in a Fall oversight session with WorkSource Montgomery to strategically align funding and outcomes for the County's workforce development efforts.

Following a PHED / EC joint committee discussion on March 15, 2021 on Employment and Continued Education Opportunities for Career Pathway Students During and After the COVID-19 Health Pandemic, the joint committee scheduled a second discussion on Talent Pipelines in the County: Career Pathways Post COVID-19.

This briefing aims to provide a general overview of adult English literacy programs supported by MCAEL to supplement the joint committee discussion on post-pandemic workforce strategy.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide some information about the work that the MCAEL coalition does that aligns ESOL classes with workforce development for adult learners.

One of the challenges over the years (prior to the establishment of WorkSource Montgomery) was the fact that Montgomery County did not have a listing of workforce development programs. MCAEL coalition members created a list in or around 2013/2014 which also provided the level of English needed to best utilize those programs. We are happy to now work with WorkSource as they are creating new tools and databases for community use.

As the conversations continue about supporting and building a workforce development system in the county, it is imperative to recognize the crucial role that programs such as those in the MCAEL network play in workforce development that support their clients. Not only do they provide these services, but they are the front line workers who know what their clients need. A workforce system in Montgomery County necessarily connects all workforce development opportunities – from community-based programs and organically developed opportunities to formal programs such as a Mi-Best type program other credentialling programs at Montgomery College which incorporate English and workforce skill development together.

I have provided a few examples of how ESOL and workforce development are interrelated in the ESOL classes (MCAEL collects qualitative data such as these success stories twice per year from grant partners). Many of our programs provide specific job preparation training as well as job coaches, etc. These stories are from our most recent funding year. (please note that some of these stories are written by program staff for whom English is not their first language.)

CASA Workforce ESOL Programs

To ensure that day laborers and our LEP community members at large have access to critical ESOL instruction for workplace application during the pandemic, this fall CASA hosted additional classes via Facebook Live on a variety of themes pulled from the Workforce ESOL curriculum. Thirty-minute lessons were held on a monthly basis and covered the following topics: employer introductions, wage negotiation, workplace safety, and tenants' rights. The lessons proved to be very popular with an average of 1,700 views per lesson and a total of 8,566 views overall as of 12/18/20. As the pandemic continues, we



plan to host additional Facebook Live lessons into the winter and potentially into the spring as well.

Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington

Bernard enrolled in the ESOL program after completing Catholic Charities' Food Services training. Due to the shortage of employment opportunities in the restaurant industry during the current public health crisis, Bernard decided to explore other career options. After enrolling in our advanced level ESOL course to improve his English skills, Bernard asked Catholic Charities for assistance in finding other employment possibilities. He also requested guidance on how to complete the GED so he could enroll in more advanced training courses. The ESOL instructor worked closely with Bernard to explore different partner programs and he was able to successfully enroll for classes at Montgomery College.

Identity, Inc.

"Ana" is from El Salvador and arrived in the U.S. five years ago. Ana enrolled in our center in October 2020 and, from the beginning, demonstrated determination and eagerness to learn, expressing in her intake that "she wants to learn as much as she possibly can" from our organization. Ana has shown commitment to work towards reaching her goals of attending college, opening her own electrical repair service company, and mastering the English language. In order to do so, Ana has been very engaged and is one of the most consistent students, frequently participating and asking questions. Ana has also received case management with emergency food assistance as well as workforce development services from our organization. As a result of more comfort and knowledge of the English language, Ana felt ready to explore and apply to electrical technician programs. With the help of our job coaches, Ana received a scholarship from Montgomery College to study to become an electrician. Ana is the first in her family to attend college and looks forward to taking more classes in the future. Ana has also attended several entrepreneurship workshops with Montgomery College and Identity in hopes of one day opening up her own electrical repair service company.

Vietnamese American Services (English for Specific Needs)

VAS realized that many community members are struggling with reducing income due to the pandemic. Their restaurants closed or only take to-go orders so they do not hire as many waiters or cooks as before. Same as nail workers, the nail salons have to limit their capacity and not many clients who want to do nails like before, so their income are reduced significantly.

Considering the circumstance, VAS launched a new project to help people apply jobs. When people need help to get jobs, we have informal assessments to match the capacities and



needs of the candidates to the available jobs. So far, we have connecting candidates to jobs with corporations and small jobs too and 25 people got jobs successfully since September 1st.

- 1- Amazon warehouses hire workers all the time. But candidates have to apply online and have to do the tests online. Candidates need to have English as high beginners. VAS helped clients to fill the application, do the tests online, set up appointments for interviews, health checks. 6 people got jobs with Amazon.
- 2- We have a MOU with Diezt and Watson (a company make ham, cheeses, sausages, have a factory in Baltimore) to recruit workers for them continuously. We do outreach and recruit people for them 4-6 people per month. We do interviews and hire workers at VAS office, instruct candidates to get health check and our staff will be at the factory to interpret on the orientation day. 15 people have started working in the factory since September. They don't need to know a word in English and if they have no transportation, we pair them with people with cars and English, so they can support each other. The company is very happy with our services, so they donate their foods to our seniors every week.

We also connected people with small jobs like home care services to take care for Vietnamese seniors, babysitting and fixing houses in the community. Regarding to fixing houses in the community, we invited teachers who are experienced and trained with construction, plumbing, electrician to train other community members who are handy and want to do the jobs but need learning more the vocabulary, the basic knowledge so they can read instructions or have deeper understanding of the handy jobs.

In our workforce development class, learners are provided educational materials on plumbing and construction courses for beginners. They are given homework, demonstrations, quizzes, and exams throughout the semester. Our workforce development instructor grade them based on attendance and skill demonstrations. If a learner failed to attend 20% of class time, they will automatically be dropped from the course and will have to re-register if they wanted to come back.

If graduated from the course, learners will be awarded with a certificate, which will allow them to practice or accept basic plumbing and/or construction jobs working under the instructor's license.

Please feel free to contact MCAEL for further information and discussion. Attached to this memorandum is a list of MCAEL's current grant supported programs. In addition, there are another 20-30 programs in the county that teach English to adults. MCAEL provides training, resources, technical assistance to those programs, as well, supporting and building a system of ESOL to meet adult learners' needs. One of the primary needs the



learners articulate in their goals are increasing their English skills to support their education goals and finding jobs.





2022 Grant Awards

The goal of the MCAEL grants program is to increase the availability of adult ESOL and literacy services that support identified community needs and diverse populations while also supporting improvement of the quality of services. MCAEL is pleased to partner once again with the Montgomery County Government to offer grant support in FY22 for programs during the period July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022. MCAEL's FY22 priorities are to support the expansion of services in areas where adult ESOL learning opportunities are scarce, including Upcounty and East County, and for populations that lack access, as well as weekend classes. These priorities are identified through an annual analysis of data collected from providers. MCAEL also supports provision of childcare and transportation to address these barriers to attending class.

Our Process

Funding decisions are made by a volunteer Grant Review Panel composed of community members. The panel members are selected to represent a diversity of experience and expertise in one or more of the following: the local community and community needs, nonprofit management, adult literacy and grant making.

Timeline

January/February • MCAEL grant guidelines released; Grant Information session held Mid-March • Appointments available with MCAEL staff to answer questions about the grant application forms

Early-April • Application deadline **May/June** • Grant Panel members review applications & interview applicants • Panel meets to develop funding recommendations
• MCAEL Board reviews/approves funding

June • Applicants are notified in writing of the MCAEL board's final funding decision.
